Equipment

1. Large selection of boxes from food packaging
2. Large sheet of cardboard (Amazon box or Ikea packaging)
3. Elmer's glue and solid glue stick
4. Selection of shapes cut from colored paper or wrapping paper
5. Markers



What to do

1. Seal the food packaging boxes with a little clear tape.
2. Glue the boxes together (using the Elmer's glue) into a crazy sculpture using the large sheet of cardboard as the base.
3. Explore how high they can pile without toppling!
4. Remember to expand out as well as up.
5. Allow the sculpture to dry before the next decorating stage
6. Use the shapes cut from colored paper to embellish the sculpture. Glue them using the solid glue stick.
7. Use markers to add more intricate details: windows, doors, roads, roof top swimming pools, terraces, bus stops

Say It, Throw It

What You'll Need:

- Baskets and/or boxes
- some balls
- stairs
- permanent marker
(optional)

Instructions:

Put some baskets on the stairs. Write some numbers or letters on your balls (or just use the colours like we did.) Ask your child to say the sound/number/colour and get them to throw it down the stairs and see if it lands in a basket.

Always supervise on stairs



Forest Snowflake

Collect sticks (we used three). Arrange into snowflake shape and tie with string in the middle. Using PVA glue stick cotton wool balls too the sticks. Hang with ribbon or string.

PHONICS PEG HUNT

Write some letters on a set of pegs and hide them around your house or garden. Write the letters on a piece of card. Ask your child to hunt for the pegs and match them to the letters on the card.

MAKE PAPER TOWEL MARKER MAGIC

This is such a simple activity, yet hours of awe and beauty! All you need are paper towels, water, a plate or shallow dish, and washable markers. We used Crayola, but any water soluble marker would work. Fold a paper towel in half like a card. On the front of the paper towel card, make a very simple design. Then inside, add more details and colors. Drop the paper towel into the water and watch the designs appear and colors spread!



SPECTACULAR SKITTLES!

You will need:

Empty bottles toilet roll tubes/empty tin cans
Craft resources- paints, pens, paper, stickers
A ball
Paper and pens

1. Design and create your set of skittles! Maybe choose a theme- dinosaurs, animals, princesses, pirates, Easter.
2. Number your skittles. Let your child copy the numbers if they are unsure.
3. Get playing!!

Extend this activity by: tallying the points on a scoreboard; adding together numbers on the skittles; creating a certificate or rosette for the winner!



MAKE A SOCK PUPPET



YOU WILL NEED

- AN OLD SOCK
- STRING
- PIPE CLEANERS OR WOOL
- FELT
- FELT TIP PENS
- GLUE
- SCISSORS

WHAT TO DO

1. PUT YOUR HAND INTO THE SOCK, MAKE A C SHAPE.
2. DRAW EYES ON USING A PEN OR STICK ON GOOGLY EYES
3. TAKE SOCK OFF HAND. LAY FLAT.
4. STICK ON STRING, PIPE CLEANERS AS HAIR.
5. MAKE EARS FROM FELT AND STICK ON
